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CHAIRMAN'S REMARKS

Experiencing the finanical difficulty in 91 as a result of the disastrous annual fund raising via flag selling, the Association explored the chance of being admitted to the Community Chest and was funded for the first time in 93. The Chest support accounts for roughly 50% of the annual expenses. The Royal Hong Kong Jockey Club following its initial tie-over financial gift in 92, continues to be the Association's major donor in the succeeding years. The Association continues exploring other sources of financial income such as private and personal appeal. It is envisaged that this search for additional financial resources will continue until subvention is possible.

On production aspect, Technical Aids Services to the Disabled continued to meet the target production while serving an increasing number of clients. Service has also been extended to repair and maintenance of aids. Jobs had been mostly production of simple devices. Several development projects were either completed or underway. Quality assurance has been further improved via distribution of and discussion on Users' Satisfaction Form. Users' participation is also being further promoted via organisation of sharing sessions, questionaires and distribution of our product catalogues.

Computer Aids Services for the Disabled continued to maintain a steady client pool. Requests had been mainly hardware-oriented. Of the several ongoing development projects, the highly demanded Mini Braille Input Device presently being further developed, will incorporate additional functional features. It is a good example of successful teamwork, consisting of our own registered volunteers and students recruited from the Hong Kong City Polytechnic.

With the ending of sponsorship from Keswick Foundation in March 93, Electronic Communication for the Disabled is presently partially supported by the Community Chest and partially via annual subscription. The service pool sees an increase and the service content in response to users' need, is being enriched in the Chinese-based information.

Rehabilitation Software Library continues to expand its collection partly via access to relevant public domain softwares and partly via our volunteers' effort of development. Apple II software can now be run under IBMPC. Two batches of catalogue had been issued during this period.

Our Desktop Publishing by the Disabled continued to grow over the period in both facility and business activity. Training courses had been organised under the sponsorship of the Employees' Retraining Board. Government subvention is also being sought via Social Welfare Department.

Service coverage from our Occupational Therapy/Physiotherapy Service has been extended for elderly in aged homes and hostels to severe grade menally handicapped adults. Domiciliary Occupational Therapy, in view of the growing demand, has now been separated from Technical Aids Services to the Disabled and becomes an independent service. Both services continued to provide assessment, education and training and aids recommendation. This service is expected to continue to grow as the Housing Authority extends its Estate Social Service for the Elderly Project to other estates.

Care for the Elderly Living Alone referred mostly by home help teams continued with the on-site provision of medical check-up and consultation by our volunteers nurses and recommendation on home adaptation and daily living aids and referrals, whenever necessary, to other social service agencies. This service helps to extend such appropriate services to the physically weak and home-bound elderly living alone.

Independent Living Fund had grown during this period via donations of \$100,000 from the Hong Kong Bank Foundation and \$50,000 from the Marden Foundation Ltd. The upper loan limit and longest repayment period had been increased to \$25,000 and 30 months respectively in order to benefit a larger population.

The Association had successfully recruited 67 new volunteers over the last 2 years. Hopefully active service participation amongst the volunteers could be promoted through increased effort in promotion and orientation. Also a total of 27 incoming organisational visits had been received, 8 outgoing organisational visits made, 6 newspapers and TV interviews conducted, 5 promotional activities carried out and 4 staff training of different forms provided.

The Engineering and Medical Services had provided 6 consultations by our volunteer engineers on civil and structural enquiries and 26 health talks, medical check-ups and consultations by our volunteer doctors and nurses to elderly centres.

As an interesting statistics, the total client-service number (i.e. summing the estimated number of clients served by each of our services) has greatly increased over the years and stands at 46,282 and 66,273 for the year 92/93 and 93/94 respectively. With all our devoted effort, we can be sure this figure can continue to grow in the years to come.

Services REPORT

Technical Aids Services for the Disabled (TASD)

In the year 1992-1994, the Technical Aids Services for the Disabled continued its work on the design and fabrication of technical aids that were inexpensive and suitable for local needs. In addition to the production of technical devices, the service was extended to provide repair and maintenance services for electric wheelchair and electronic speech aid users. Under these maintenance schemes, routine checking and repair work were provided for the participants of the schemes.

Several developmental projects were completed in the past two years. The prototype of the new version of automatic feeding device, the lighting training system and the queue up indicator were completed. Users would be invited to try out these new devices and modifications would be made accordingly.

To monitor the quality of the technical aids we produced, a Users' Satisfaction Form was distributed to every service user to collect their feedbacks on the aids. The data collected was discussed during the Technical Service Team meeting and follow up actions were taken whenever negative feedback from the users was received.

To facilitate development of new devices that were useful to the disabled, four sharing sessions, participated by rehabilitation workers were held to solicit their ideas for the development of new technical aids. A questionnaire which aimed to identify problems the workers encountered in their work was designed and distributed to rehabilitation agencies. With the availability of these information, the aids designed could be ensured to meet the needs of the users.

Two issues of Project Catalogue were produced and distributed in the past 2 years. A total of 40 technical aids were presented in these two batches. The catalogues were well received by users and rehabilitation professionals as an useful reference.



Local Production Reserve

Two new products were developed for batch production during this period. These products were found suitable for local needs for a large group of users and were readily available. Camera stand was modified into adjustable walking stick for the blind and a small batch was produced. A foldable chair was modified into a bed side commode chair and the prototype was demonstrated to potential users. Batch production would start once when the actual demand for the aids was confirmed.

Development of the new version of Mini Braille Input Device was in its final stage. The prototype of the device would be ready for trial by the users shortly. Batch production would be launched after the demand for the device was finalised.

Computer Aids Services for the Disabled (CASD)

In the past two years, the service continued to serve its objective in coordinating professional volunteers in the development of computer aids for disabled for their medical and rehabilitative treatment, training, education, employment and daily living. Services provided included the design, fabrication and repair of computer aids.

Requests in the past two years were mainly on computer hardware. They were mostly applications for computer access aids such as keyboard guard, interface box and scanning keyboard. These were designed to help the disabled to have access to computer inspite of their disabilities. Regarding the software design, the requests were either for educational or rehabilitative purposes.

In addition to the handling of incoming requests, the volunteers were also engaged in the development of new projects such as the Mini Braille Input Device (MBID), the Simple Talker and the Grip Strengthening Device.

The Mini Braille Input Device was first developed to help the blind to use computer. Due to the great demand for the device and the functional problems identified by the users, a new version of the device was designed and fabricated. The project was in good progress and would be completed within 1994.

The new MBID consisted of a braille keyboard for input, a voice synthesizer for output and software programs. The device functioned as an electronic notepad for the blind and could help them to utilize the computer. This project was taken up by two City Polytechnic students Mr. Alex Yip and Mr. Stephen Chau with support given by our volunteers and the MBID users. With the availability of this device, the blind could have direct access to computer.

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Besides the MBID, the Simple Talker was designed to help those with speech problems to communicate with others. Some commonly used phrases were recorded and the users could select the appropriate phrase by simple switches.

Rehabilitation Software Library

The Library had now a collection of over 250 softwares and 20 hardwares. These materials served as reference for rehabilitation workers in their planning of education and training programmes for their clients. In the past years, effort was put on the collection of relevant softwares from public domain so as to enrich the content of the library. Our volunteers continued to develop relevant software for inclusion into the library. Moreover, Apple II software could now be run under IBM PC through the emulation software in the personal computers. This could open more opportunities for the library members to use the enormous amount of Apple II base software. During this period, two batches of software catalogue were issued. The catalogue could be used as a reference for library members to identify their needed software. Catalogue would be updated and distributed to library members when sufficient software had been collected.

Electronic Communication for the Disabled

The service was started in July 1990 with the sponsorship from Keswick Foundation. It aimed at encouraging the disabled to communicate with others independently beyond the confines of their disabilities and providing opportunities for them to utilize the computer.

The sponsorship from Keswick Foundation ended in March, 1993. Since then, the project was partly supported by the Community Chest while the participating agencies and individual members also paid an annual fee \$200 and \$100 respectively for the service. To ease the financial burden of the participating agencies, support from the Hongkong Telecom and the Trailwalker was solicited to sponsor the datel line fee.



 Christmas gathering participated by members of the Electronic Communication for the disabled. During this period, the Association of the Blind had withdrawn from the service as they had set up their own computer communication network. A new agency, Hong Kong Red Cross Shun Lee Hostel joined the service making the total number of participating agencies to 10. The number of individual users increased was 27.

The content of the service had changed in response to the needs of the users. International mailing was terminated as the usage rate was unsatisfactory. More Chinese information was collected in the database and news program. The information included computer glossary, Chinese data input method, computer technology and some interesting games. South China Morning Post was still available. To enrich the content, scanner was used to transfer information with graphics to the users. A manual on using this function was prepared for users' reference.

The volunteers involved were largely civil engineers. The incoming requests were mainly inquiries on dangerous slopes and structural conditions of buildings etc..

Occupational Therapy / Physiotherapy Services

The target clients of this service was extended from elderly residents of aged homes / hostels to severe grade mentally handicapped adults. These mentally handicapped adults were firstly assessed by our Occupational Therapist. Simple training programme was subsequently designed for each client and implemented by the volunteers under the guidance of our therapist. During the past two years twenty one clients were served.

In addition to the provision of direct service, educational talks were also rendered to care givers of aged homes and multi-service centres for the elderly. These talks aimed to enrich the knowledge of the care givers so as to enhance the quality of the services rendered to their clients.

Independent Living Fund

The Fund aimed at providing financial support to the disabled in the form of interest free loans for the purchase of rehabilitation aids. The upper limit of the loan was \$25,000 and the maximum repayment period was 30 months. The applicant had to repay the loan in form of monthly installments.

In the past years, the applicants of the Fund included physically handicapped, visually impaired, chronically ill and mentally handicapped. Besides rehabilitation aids, computer was a very popular item amongst these applications. The applicants were required to attend an assessment and an interview to examine the eligibility of their applications. Up till now, the operation of the Fund remained very smooth and no bad debt had been incurred.

The Fund continued to receive financial support from funding bodies. A sum of \$100,000 from The Hong Kong Bank Foundation and a sum of \$50,000 from The Marden Foundation Limited were received during this period. More funding sources would be explored so as to maximize the number of disabled benefited from the Fund.

Care for Elderly Living Alone

In view of the growing elderly population, this service which started in 1990 aimed at providing preventive measure to the elderly living alone on the problem of health and home safety. Majority of the elderly served was referred by home help teams as this group of elderly was largely physically weak and home bound. They lacked knowledge on health care and community resources. Home visits were paid by our volunteer nurses who provided medical check up and consultation to these elderly. In addition, recommendation and provision of daily living aids were also given whenever necessary. Referrals to other social service agencies were also made.

In the past two years, a total of 53 elderly were served. Besides the provision of medical check up and consultation, home adaptations and aids were also recommended. With the availability of this service, health and home safety problems of some elderly were identified at an early stage and remedial measures could be taken as soon as possible. This service was welcomed by the home help teams and co-operation with these teams would be continued in the coming year. In addition to individual service, other supportive service such as health talk and seminar on personal care, medication and the application of aids were also organised for the care givers.

Desktop Publishing by the Disabled

Significant progress was made by the workshop throughout the past two years. The workshop proved to be a success in the provision of training and employment opportunities for the disabled. After two years' operation, the no. of customers and the business volume had grown enormously. The availability of a set of printing machine and the associated accessories partly accounted for the expansion of the business. The workshop could now take up the printing of name cards, booklets and pamphlets etc.. Our network of customers had extended from the social service sector to the commercial sector and religious organisations. The nature of the job orders also varied.

With the growth in the business volume, there came the need for recruitment of more workers. In the past year, there were some turnover among the workers as a few of them are able to secure open employment. To cope with the work of the printing section, a part time worker was employed to handle the paper sorting, packing and mailing jobs.

To enable more disabled to participate in this workshop, training courses were organised. With the sponsorship of the Employees Retraining Board, training courses on Basic Chinese Computing and Desktop Publishing were organised in March 93. The courses were very intensive and practical. The organisation of additional courses would be considered whenever there was the need.

Another significant development of the workshop was the possibility of obtaining government subvention for this service. This project was submitted to the Social Welfare Department who expressed great interest in this service. The feasibility of subventing the service was now under consideration. The progress of the application would be closely monitored.

NEW PROJECT

Domiciliary Occupational Therapy

This service was previously put under our Technical Aids Services for the Disabled but due to the large number of referrals received, a separate service was established. This service aimed to provide:

- (1) assessment on daily living activities;
- (2) recommendation on home modification and self care equipment;
- (3) education of care givers.

Majority of these clients were elderly referred by the Estate Social Service for the Elderly Project launched by the Housing Authority. Home adaptation, advice and training on daily living activities were rendered. Technical aids, mostly mobility aids and daily living aids were prescribed and provided. As the Housing Authority would extend the project to other housing estates, it is foreseeable that there would be gradual increase in referrals in the coming year.

MEMBERS AND VOLUNTEERS MANAGEMENT

Recruitment of volunteers needs to be done periodically to add new blood to our voluntary service team. Recruitment program included posting notice in newspapers, sending recruitment letters and pamphlets to related companies or organizations. Overall speaking, the results of these effort were encouraging and quite a no. of volunteers from the nursing profession and computer technology field were recruited.

During this period, 67 new volunteers joined the Association. As at March 31, 1994, the Association had a total of 26 members and 321 volunteers. Three orientation sessions for new volunteers were held throughout this period. Orientation was held prior to their participation in our service. A thorough introduction of our services is essential to prepare the new volunteers for participation in the voluntary work. Sharing amongst the volunteers of their

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past volunteer experience and their aims of joining the service was emphasized in the orientation session. It also served as an effective way of communication with the volunteers and to establish their sense of belonging to the Association.

To have effective management of the large number of volunteers and members, computerization of their information was necessary. This would be implemented with the help from the volunteers. Besides, the feedback of the service was collected from those volunteers who had involved in our services during and after the delivery of service. Their opinion was important to facilitate the future planning and development of each service.

The layout of the Bulletin was improved as it was produced by our desktop publishing workshop starting from 1993. All the design and paste-up work were done in the computer and the style and content of the Bulletin would be revised periodically in response to the feedback from the readers.

Financial Secretary's Report

Expenditure of the Association for the financial year 1993-1994 was HK\$2,486,250. This represented a 45% increase over that of the financial year 1992-1993.

Staff emolument was still the largest expenditure item which increased 17.4% from HK\$1,080,252 in the financial year 1992-1993 to 1,268,039 in the financial year 1993-1994.

The second and the third largest item of expenditure were related to the operation of the Desktop Publishing Workshop which amounted to HK\$700,669 and the establishment of the vocational training courses which amounted to HK\$325,772.

The Community Chest granted HK\$723,000 to the Association in the financial year 1993-1994 to support the following services:

- Technical Aids Services for the Disabled
- Computer Aids Services for the Disabled
- Electronic Communication for the Disabled
- Care for the Elderly Living Alone
- Desktop Publication by the Disabled
- Occupational Therapy/Physiotherapy Service

- Domiciliary Occupational Therapy Service
- Members & Volunteers Management

Community Chest's allocation was the largest single item of income of the Association. Apart from this, the Association had received subvention from the Hong Kong Jockey Club Charities Trust which amounted to HK\$100,000 while HK\$370,331 donations were also received from the general public.

As the Association will be receiving annual allocation from the Chest and the Jockey Club, the financial condition becomes less critical. However, the Association still has a shortfall of about HK\$250,000 in 1994-1995 when compared with the budget expenditure of the year. According to the current plan of the Executive Committee, this shortfall has to be largely covered by donations.

As seen from the above, the Association is still financially unstable and if the Association has to maintain its present level of service, government subvention should be the long term solution.

The Association would like to express its deepest gratitude to all sectors of the community for their co-operation in supporting our services in various aspects. We heartedly thank all volunteers and donors for their efforts and continuous support during the year under review.

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主 席報告

在經歷過九一年因售旗籌款的結果未如想理而引致的財政困難後,本會尋求加入公益金成爲會員的機會,並於九三年首次獲得資助,公益金的資助大概佔支出的五成。此外,賽馬會慈善基金除撥款解決燃眉之急外,更繼續捐助,成爲本會其中一個主要的財政來源。本會仍會繼續通過私人募捐籌募經費。在可見將來,協會仍需積極尋找其他財政來源,直至獲得政府資助。

在生產方面,弱能人士輔助儀器製作服務仍然本著一貫的生產目標為不斷增長的使用者提供服務。服務範圍亦擴展至爲輔助儀器提供維修及保養服務。大部份的申請仍爲製作一些較簡單的儀器。在發展性計劃當中,數個已經完成,其他的亦正處於研究及製作階段。爲提高產品的質素,所有用者均被邀請填寫「使用者意見調查表」,他們的意見都會作個別討論及跟進。此外,透過與其他機構的分享,收集他們的意見及派發儀器目錄,用者的參與會大爲增强。

弱能人士電腦輔助儀器製作服務持續有穩定的申請,申請以 硬件爲主。在數個發展性計劃當中,需求量大的微型點字輸入器 正進行改良,以增加其功能。這是一個隊際工作成功的例子,隊 員包括協會的義工及從城市理工學院招募的學生。

凱瑟克基金給予展能通訊的贊助已於九三年三月結束,現時該服務的經費,部份由公益金資助。此外,參加者的年費亦爲收入之一,在過去兩年,參加人數亦有增加,服務內容亦因應用者的需要而改進,尤其是在中文資料庫方面。

為增加復康軟件圖書館的藏量,圖書館繼續搜集適合的公用軟件及由義工所設計的軟件,其次,大部份APPLE II 軟件現以可在IBM個人電腦下使用。在過去兩年共出版了兩期的軟件目錄供使用者參考。

電腦排版中心的業務在過去兩年,有持續的增長。並在僱員 再培訓局的贊助下,開辦有關的電腦課程。同時,排版中心亦積 極尋找社會福利署的資助。

職業治療/物理治療服務已將其服務對象由老人院舍的老人 推廣至嚴重弱智的成人。同時,由於對家居職業治療服務的需求 日增,故將該項服務與弱能人士輔助儀器製作服務分開作獨立處 理。上述兩項服務均爲有需要人士提供評估教育/訓練及推薦合 適的輔助儀器,由於房屋署將會擴展「屋郵老人社會服務計劃」 ,故預計這些服務的需求,將會大大增加。

關懷獨居老人計劃的服務對象主要由家務助理隊所轉介,由 協會的護士義工爲他們提供上門的健康檢查及諮詢。此外,協會 的職業治療師並會就選擇輔助儀器及家居改裝提供意見,如有需 要亦會將個案轉介至其他社會服務機構。

在過去兩年,展能基金獲滙豐銀行信託基金及馬登基金分別 捐助十萬元及五萬元,基金的最高貸款額亦增至二萬五千元,而 最長還款則期爲三十個月。這些改動目的是希望更多傷殘人士受 惠。

在九二至九四年度,共有六十七位新的義工加入本會,透過加强推廣及迎新活動,希望這些生力軍能夠積極參與協會的服務。同時,在這段期間,共有二十七個機構曾到本會參觀,本會職員亦曾參觀過八間機構,接受過六次報章及電視訪問,同時參加了五次推廣活動及四次職員培訓課程。

工程/醫療服務共提供六次有關土木工程結構方面的諮詢服務。此外,亦包括二十六次的健康講座、身體檢查及健康諮詢服務,這些服務均由協會的醫生及護士義工所提供。

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上述資料反映了一個有趣的現象,接受協會服務的用者總人數有大幅增長,由九二至九三年的四萬六千二百八十二增至九三至九四年度的六萬六千二百七十三人。在我們不斷的努力下,我們深信這些數字將會不斷增加。




弱能人士輔助儀器製作服務

在九二至九四年間,弱能人士輔助儀器製作服務除繼續爲傷 殘人士設計及製造價廉及適合本港人士需要的輔助儀器外,更把 服務範圍推展至爲電動輪椅及電子發聲器提供維修保養,服務內 容包括爲參與者的儀器提供定期檢查及修理服務。

過去一年,下列各項發展性計劃亦已完成:自動餵食器新型 號的試用模型,及排隊顯示器。本會將會邀請傷殘人士試用這些 儀器,並按他們的建議,改善各儀器的操作。

爲確保本會製造的各種儀器的質素,每位使用者都會被邀請 填寫一份意見書,所收集的意見都會在技術服務小組中提出討論 ;若接到反面的意見,小組便會作出適當的跟進行動。

本會曾與復康工作者舉行了四次討論會,以聽取他們對傷殘 人士所需的輔助儀器的意見;在會上,與會者更被邀填寫一份問

卷,以反映他們在工作上所遇到的種種問題。這些資料有助於確保我們所設計及製造的儀器的實用性。

過去兩年內,我們出版了兩輯的輔助儀器目錄,合共介紹了 四十種輔助儀器,供使用者參考。

輔助儀器生產計劃

九二至九四年間,本會揀選了兩種新的輔助儀器作限量生產。這兩種儀器,能滿足本港某類別傷殘人士的普遍需要。第一種是由相機腳架改裝的失明人手杖,已有小量存貨。另一種是床邊可摺疊便椅。試用模型已經設計及製造完成,並已向有關人士作出介紹,一俟需求量確定後,生產程序便即開始。

同時,微型點字輸入器新型號的試用模型亦已進入完成階段,短期內模型便可試用。確定需求量後,產品亦會即時投產。

弱能人士電腦輔助儀器製作服務

在過去兩年,服務範圍仍爲傷殘人士提供在醫療、復康治療、訓練、就業及日常生活各方面設計、製造及維修電腦輔助儀器等服務爲主。近年的申請個案多與電腦硬件的控制裝置有關,如鍵盤導引板、鍵盤介面器及掃描式鍵盤等。這些輔助儀器有助弱能人士克服各種不同類型的障礙,以便能控制及使用電腦。至於軟件設計方面申請個案則多涉及教育與復康用途。

本會義工不單因應外來要求而設計軟件及/或硬件裝置,他們更會開展一些發展性的計劃,例如微型點字輸入器、語言發聲器、電腦握力計等。

微型點字輸入器是專為幫助失明人士使用電腦而設計,現有使用者約五十人。本會將於本年內推出輸入器的新型號,新的設計主要就用者指出的一些操作毛病,加以改良而製成。輸入器由點字鍵盤、聲音合成器及有關軟件組合而成,只要把訊息以點字輸入,資料便能以聲音輸出。輸入器的設計及製作由城市理工的兩位同學葉天仁及鄒世錦負責。透過與其他義工及使用者的緊密合作,整個計劃料可於一九九四年底完成。

此外,義工亦致力研究語言發聲器,它的主要功用在於幫助 有言語障礙的傷殘人士,與他人溝通。它先把一些常用短語儲藏 ,使用者透過簡單的按鈕,便可選擇適用的語句來傳情達意。

復康軟件圖書館

圖書館現藏有超過二百五十種軟件及二十種硬件,當復康工作者爲其服務對象安排教育及訓練計劃時,圖書館內的資料,便可供參考及使用。爲充實圖書館的內容,本會除不斷採納一些公用軟件外,我們的義工並會設計不同的軟件,以豐富圖書館的存量。

圖書館存有一批以早期蘋果系統操作的軟件,爲使使用IBM個人電腦的機構及個人,都可以使用該批軟件,經轉換格式後,這 批軟件已可應用於IBM個人電腦,圖書館的會員將有更多的選擇。

過去兩年內,圖書館共出版了兩期軟件目錄;新的目錄將會 寄付各圖書館會員,以協助他們使用圖書館的資源。

展能通訊

展能通訊於一九九〇年七月正式成立,旨在鼓勵傷殘人士透 過電腦多與外界接觸,並藉此增進其使用電腦的技能。

凱瑟克基金自九一年三月爲此項服務提供爲期兩年的贊助,但自凱瑟克基金的贊助於九三年三月終結後,服務的經費主要來自公益金及會員繳交的服務年費(機構會員年費爲二百元,個人會員則爲一百元)。爲減輕會員的財政負擔,本會現已取得香港電訊及毅行者的贊助,支付資料電話線的租用費。

在此期間,香港失明人協進會由於已自行成立了自己的通訊 網絡,而退出展能通訊,同時香港紅十字會順利宿舍則加入成為 新機構會員。

展能通訊現有十名機構會員及二十七名個人會員。通訊內容亦按會員需求,而有所改變。國際通訊服務由於使用率偏低,已經終止。代之,資料庫儲存了更多的中文資訊及新聞項目。中文資訊有電腦字彙、中文輸入法、電腦科技及一些有趣的遊戲。而新聞方面,爲了使現有的南華早報的資料更加豐富多姿,我們使用了掃描器,輸入圖表資料,並已編寫了一本使用手冊,供使用參考。

職業治療/物理治療服務

此項服務的對象已由居住於院舍的老人,擴展至嚴重弱智的 成年人。本會的職業治療師首先對這些弱智人士作出評估,擬定 一些簡單的訓練計劃,並指導義工按計劃爲弱智人士提供訓練, 在過去兩年內共有二十一位弱智人士接受此項服務。

除爲個人提供直接服務,本會義工更爲老人院及社區老人服 務中心的同工,提供講座,協助他們爲有需要人士提供更完善的 服務。

展能基金

展能基金爲傷殘人士提供購買輔助儀器的免息貸款,最高貸款額爲港幣二萬五千元,貸款人以每月供款型式償還貸款,最長還款期爲三十個月。

向基金借貸的傷殘人士包括肢體傷殘人士,弱視人士,弱智人士及長期病患者。除購買輔助儀器外,電腦亦是傷殘人士貸款購買的主要儀器。每項貸款申請必須經基金的評審小組仔細審核,貸款人並需接受面見,詳細解說貸款要求。基金成立至今,運作順暢,亦從未有壞賬。

過去兩年,基金曾接受香港滙豐銀行的港幣十萬元及馬登基 金港幣五萬元捐款。本會會繼續聯絡其他贊助機構,以期加强基 金的借貸實力,爲傷殘人士帶來更多的資助。

關懷獨居老人計劃

鑑於老年人口不斷增長,本會於一九九零年成立關懷獨居老人計劃,旨在爲獨居老人提供有關健康及家居安全等問題的預防服務。服務對象主要是由家務助理隊所轉介的體弱或行動不便者。他們對保健常識及社會資源缺乏瞭解。本會提供的服務包括:安排護士義工家訪,爲老人作健康檢查、建議及提供有需要的日常生活輔助儀器、按老人的其他需要,轉介有關的服務機構。

過去兩年,此項服務曾協助了五十三位獨居老人,除提供身體檢查服務外,更爲老人提供改善家居環境及使用輔助儀器的建議。透過這項服務,一些獨居老人的健康及家居問題,便能及早發現及改善,以免造成更大的危險。家務助理隊對此項服務,極爲歡迎;而在未來,此服務會繼續與家務助理隊緊密合作,轉介有需要的老人接受服務。

除上述的個人服務外,本服務亦有爲照顧老人的工作員,提供有關個人護理、藥物常識及如何使用輔助儀器等座談會,以提高他們有關照顧老人方面的知識。


電腦排版中心

電腦排版中心在過去兩年取得了長足的發展,它成功地爲傷 殘人士提供訓練及就業機會。成立兩年後,中心的顧客數目及生 意額,均節節上升。中心擁有印刷機及其他有關器材,對擴展業 務有一定的幫助。中心現可印製的產品包括名片、單張及小冊子 等;而顧客類別,亦從社會服務機構擴展至工商界及宗教團體; 訂單的內容亦日趨多變。

由於營業額的增長,及一些中心員工因取得公開就業機會而轉職,中心將要招募新僱員。為應付印刷工序的需求,中心聘用了一位兼職僱員,協助做一些揀紙、包裝及郵遞等工作。

為方便更多傷殘人士參與中心的工作,在九三年三月,得僱 員再培訓局贊助,本會舉辦了基本中文電腦及中文桌面排版課程 ,以培養更多人材,如有需要,本會將會繼續舉辦類似的課程。

中心的另一些重要發展是有取得政府資助的可能性。本會已 向社會福利署遞交申請,該署現正考慮此申請,希望能於短期內 能有結果。



爲保持與會員及義工之間的聯絡,本會已發信邀請各會員/ 義工更新他們的聯絡電話及地址。這項通訊資料更新活動,將會 定期舉行,以保持與會員/義工的溝通。

服務對象及提供服務的義工的意見,對確定及改善本會服務 質素,深有裨益。有見及此,本會於每次提供服務後,必向各有 關人士查詢意見,以供參考。

財務秘書報告

本會於一九九三至一九九四年度的開支為港幣貳佰肆拾捌萬 陸仟貳佰伍拾圓,較一九九二至一九九三年度的開支增長了百份 之四十五。

職員的工資仍為支出中最大的一項,一九九二年至一九九三年度的支出為港幣壹佰零捌萬零貳佰伍拾貳圓,而一九九三年至 一九九四年度則增加至壹佰貳拾陸萬捌扦零叁拾玖圓,增長比率 為百分之十七點四。

其次,最大的支出項目爲電腦排版工場的運作費用共柒拾萬 零陸佰陸拾玖圓,與及由僱員再培訓局資助舉辦的訓練課程,共 **叁**拾貳萬伍仟柒佰柒拾貳圓。

公益金的撥款仍本會最大的收入來源,此外本會亦接受賽馬會慈善基金的資助,款額爲拾萬圓正,而外界的捐款則有參拾柒 萬零參佰參拾壹圓。

由於本會已成爲公益金的會員機構及接受其資助,故經濟情況有所改善,但在一九九四年至一九九五年度,本會仍需自行籌募大約港幣貳拾伍萬圓,以補不足之數。

有鑑於此,本會的財政情況仍未完全穩定,長遠而言,仍需 爭取政府資助,以便能維持一貫的服務水平。
